Sad Passings

This is the story of my sheltie, Murphy, AKA Jade Mist's Bright Light, UD, BN, RN, PCDX, TKA, CGCA. My beloved sheltie Murphy passed away on June 16, 2025, at 12-and-half years old.

He was such a great dog. I am beyond sad. I am tearing up even as I write this. Murphy was seemingly healthy but started drinking an excessive amount of water. Bloodwork showed that his liver values were very elevated. (They were fine in December 2024.)

An ultrasound revealed a mass on his liver. A CAT scan followed. Because he was otherwise healthy, I decided in conjunction with my vet and the surgeon to proceed with surgery. Unfortunately, Murphy made it through the surgery, but his body failed, and he never regained consciousness. Murphy was very special to me. He was a piece of my heart. We were a team in life and performance activities.

I got Murphy from a well-known breeder, Jade Mist. His sire was a Grand Champion, and his dam was from Belmark. It was love at first sight when I went to choose a puppy. He was the puppy that ran up to me and covered me with "kisses." Spunky, friendly, and adorable, how could I resist?

We did Agility for fun. Because of his solid temperament, even distracting atmospheres

didn't faze him. He loved working.

When he was two years old, he began showing in Novice. It was also his first outside trial and was a hot June day. Murphy amazed me—as he often did. He got High-in-Trial. He was happy because I was.

During his obedience and rally careers, Murphy often placed first. He even tied for eighth-ranked sheltie in Open in four shows and was invited to the AKC Classic. We didn't go, but just working with him was my real reward.

Murphy used to really enjoy showing. We were a team and loved working together. For example, he placed six out of six times in three days many years ago at the Lackawanna K.C. and Williamsport DTC shows, showing three times in Open and three in Preferred Open—and he was one point from High-in-Trial in the Preferred Classes. We would play and he would greet people during his down-time.

We loved being together—whether we were practicing obedience, tricks, rally, or just hanging out. He was my little shadow who was a pleasure to be around.

Murphy had two Preferred Utility legs before the COVID pandemic hit. I showed him only a few times thereafter, and he never got the third leg. This past year, he didn't enjoy showing anymore but still loved practicing. So I retired him from formal obedience.

Even though I have other dogs, the loss of Murphy is immense. We had a special bond.

Rest in peace at the Rainbow Bridge, my little boy. I hope that we meet again.

(when he's not in the show ring looking dapper)




Carley Bates:
